1. TRAINING MANDATE:

The Finnish Defence Forces offer professional refresher language training organized by the Defence Language Centre in English, French, Swedish, Russian, and German. In addition, beginners' courses are given in French, Russian, and German. Furthermore, short-term and ad hoc task-based language training in, for example, Arabic is organized by means of outsourcing. Apart from the listed language training options available, commands, staffs, and units organize and support outsourced language training for their personnel.

Regular language programmes are run in four military schools: the National Defence University, the Army Academy, the Air Force Academy, and the Naval Academy.

The language training draws from the extensive overall foreign language studies available in Finnish comprehensive schools. Thus the Defence Forces language programmes concentrate for the most part on facilitating language skills development in military/operational language in particular.

European Credit Transfer System (ECTS) units are used to describe student achievement / workload: a credit equals 26 hours of student work. The proficiency levels listed follow the STANAG 6001 -scale.

Continuing and special language training for a considerable number of personnel and specialists at STANAG levels 2 - 4 has been organized by the Defence Language Centre and varying units both in Finland and abroad. Partly this training has been outsourced when applicable.

2. TESTING MANDATE:

The Finnish Defence Forces have their own Russian military language test organized by the Defence



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Language Centre in three levels covering the STANAG 6001 levels 1, 2 and 3-4.

As for the testing of other foreign languages, the Finnish Defence Forces rely on the CEFR-based six-level language proficiency tests organized by the National Board of Education.

When necessary, the Defence Language Centre tests the operational language proficiency of officers to be posted in international staffs / HQs and multinational operations.
